Since early March the United States and the entire world have been dealt a heavy blow with planning and preparing for the COVID-19 virus. You can be confident the top priority of the United States, the State of Minnesota and your local government is your health and safety during this time. This is a confusing and troubling time, but we will defeat this pandemic.

To help ease some concerns I want to inform all our citizens that the West Hennepin Public Safety Department will continue to provide public safety services 24 hours a day, 7 days a week. Our emergency services with police, fire, and emergency medical services will not change regarding the safety of our citizens. Emergency responses will continue and non-emergency responses will be triaged to limit contact when reasonable. I would ask our residents to be patient and understanding during this time. We still are allowing walk-in services; however, we would ask our residents to handle all non-emergency matters by calling our office at (763) 479-0500 versus responding to our office. Burn permits and other minor permits will be issued online or by phone. Civil fingerprint details for any purpose have been suspended at this time.

Due to the numerous changes each day involving COVID-19 we are directing our citizens to follow the guidelines of the MN Department of Health and the CDC to protect themselves and loved ones from getting exposed to COVID-19. Please refer to these websites for additional information:

As a result of COVID-19 we have seen an upward trend of criminals trying to take advantage of citizens. Primarily we are seeing scams via the phone and email. Please educate yourself and loved ones of these scams. Never provide any payment information over the phone or by email, bitcoin, gift cards or google play cards as they are clear examples of someone trying to steal your money. While you can't prevent all incidents of theft you can minimize your risk by managing your personal information wisely.

In the event you become a victim of theft we ask that you immediately contact your local police department to report the incident. West Hennepin Public Safety treats theft as a serious offense and we will strive to make sure all suspects are prosecuted under the law.

Together we will work through this emergency as we have worked through others in the past. Stay Strong, Be Patient, Keep Updated, and do your part to stop the spread of COVID-19.

Maple Plain Covid-19 Information

Together as a community we will overcome Covid-19! Be assured that all essential services including fire, police, water, and sewer will continue no matter the future circumstances. This means that if you call 911 during an emergency situation you will have a response from our public safety. The water will be treated and is safe to drink. You will be able to flush your toilets. In addition the City of Maple Plain is not going to be charging residents any late fees on utility bills for the first quarter. This means that the bill you have just received will not incur any late fees. Restaurants and bars with liquor licenses will receive a prorated check refunding liquor license fees for each month bars and restaurants are unable to serve. The City of Maple Plain is following the guidelines of the Minnesota Department of Health and Centers for Disease Control. Sump Pump Hose Reminder



Reminder to all residents and business owners. Please keep your sump pump hose at least 5 feet from the curb of the street. This is a City Ordinance. This is important as direct flow from the sump pump hose to the curb causes the curb to erode. This then effects rain water from getting to the storm drains. Please move your sump pump hose so that it is at least 5 Feet from the curb. Thank you so much for your understanding!

Property Taxes at a Glance

With property taxes due this May, it is a good time to review how the City has worked to reduce taxes on property owners in town. It is important to know there are four ways property taxes go up: the County can increase property taxes, school levies can increase property taxes, cities can increase property taxes, and property values also affect the amount of taxes you pay. Below are the last five years of total money collected by the City. You can see that you may be paying more in taxes each year, but the City is not collecting much more at all. Over the last five years the difference in money collected from 2016 to 2020 is \$286.00.

2016 \$1,466,233 **2017** \$1,487,034 **2018** \$1,477,524 **2019** \$1,465,844 **2020** \$1,466,509


The City Council and Staff works very hard to make sure that all dollars collected are spent responsibility and will continue to do so in the future.

The City of Maple Plain is getting plans in place for the 2020 primary and general elections, and that means we need election judges. These paid positions offer an opportunity to serve as the officials in our local polling place on Election Day, opening and closing the polls, registering and signing in voters, handling ballots, operating voting equipment, recording and certifying vote totals, and ensuring voters' rights are protected.

The City needs a few more election judges to work at the primary on Tuesday, August 11, as well as the general election on Tuesday, November 3.

In addition, there will be an election for Mayor and two City Council seats in November. Residents interested in running for City Council or Mayor must file an Affidavit of Candidacy and pay a \$2 filing fee at City Hall. Filing dates are July 28, 2020 through August 11, 2020.

Everyone Owns Waterfront Property



Did you know that everyone in your neighborhood has waterfront property? Your yard and the water's edge are connected by the nearest storm drain or ditch and what you do on your property affects the local lake, river or stream. You can help reduce the amount of pollutants entering local lakes, rivers and streams by following a few simple steps.

Rake up leaves and grass clippings, which add excess nutrients that turn our lakes and rivers green with algae. It is estimated that five 60-gallon garbage bags filled with leaves and organic matter equals about 1 pound of phosphorous which can yield up to 1,000 pounds of algae!

Dispose of pet waste, which is a major contributor of bacteria. Picking up after your pet each time and throwing the waste into the garbage is a great way to keep bacteria levels in check.

Install water-friendly landscaping such as a raingarden or pervious paver driveway that captures runoff before it reaches the storm drain.

Pet (and People) Reminders



With the spring season and warmer weather soon to be upon us, the city would like to remind you that your four-legged friend MUST BE PROPERLY RESTRAINED at all times. City Code Section 92.04 states: Dogs or cats on a leash and accompanied by a responsible person or accompanied by and under the control and direction of a responsible person, so as to be effectively restrained by command as by leash, shall be permitted in streets or on public land unless the city has posted an area with signs reading "Dogs or Cats Prohibited". In addition, any person in control of a dog off the property of its owner shall be responsible to pick up and dispose of the dog feces.

Compost Services Offered by Randy's Environmental Services

For seasonal yard waste disposal your best resource is curb side pickup by Randy's Environmental Services. (See the city website under "Public Works" for more info.)



- Randy's continues to provide curbside collection and disposal services for yard waste at no additional cost to property owner or City.
- Bag grass or leaves in compostable bags.
- Brush or branches must be cut into 4-foot lengths and bundled with natural twine (no plastic). Branches can be a maximum of 2 inches in diameter. Up to 2 bundles can be collected per week.
- Compost materials are picked up as early as 6:00 am on Mondays, the same day as your usual garbage service.
- Please use this resource as well as household recycling as they are offered free to all residents of Maple Plain and have zero impact on current collection prices.
- Randy's Environmental Service Compost Pickup does end on November 16th this Year.

Update: Party in the Park, 2020
