
Greetings Neighbors,

Primary Election Day is Tuesday, August 11, 2020. Maple Plain residents vote at City Hall, located at 5050 Independence Street, in the Council Chambers. If you voted in the last election and haven't moved or changed your name, you should be pre-registered to vote in this year's elections. **It's easy to check if you're registered** – go to www.mnvotes.org, scroll down and click on "Check my registration". Here you will also find information about how to REGISTER TO VOTE, ELECTION DATES, ABSENTEE VOTING, and VIEW THE BALLOT. There is a wealth of information and it is a very user-friendly website.



COVID-19 CONCERNS

- The best thing you can do to protect your community is to VOTE ABSENTEE BY MAIL. This will
 reduce the number of voters on election day and reduce the risk for you and for our election
 judges and staff. See below for detailed information.
- In-person Election Day voting will take place for both the Primary Election on August 11th and the General Election on November 3rd. Measures will be in place to limit exposure to the corona virus for voters and election judges and staff.
- Voters on election day are asked to wear face coverings and bring your own pen (black ink is best.) Face coverings and pens will be available at the polls as well.
- Pre-registration deadline is Tuesday, July 21, 2020 (you can also register on Election Day).

In addition to State, Federal, and Judicial offices, there will be an election for Mayor and two City Council seats in November. Residents interested in running for City Council or Mayor must file an Affidavit of Candidacy and pay a \$2 filing fee at City Hall. Filing dates are July 28, 2020 through August 11, 2020.

Absentee Voting - A Good Option

Due to the Covid-19 virus, Hennepin County has given cities the option to conduct the 2020 **Primary** absentee voting only by mail. **In order to protect the public and city staff, absentee balloting will NOT be available at City Hall for the Primary Election.**

Maple Plain voters have the option to request an absentee ballot to be mailed to them for the Primary Election on August 11th and the

General Election on November 3rd. By choosing to vote absentee, you reduce community exposure to the Covid virus and ensure that your vote is counted no matter what the weather or other circumstances in your life. You do not need a reason to vote absentee - any Minnesota voter may use this method to vote.

Requesting your absentee ballot is EASY and SECURE! Go to mnvotes.org and select "other ways to vote" to request your absentee ballot. Or, you can pick up an absentee ballot application at City Hall and mail it to Hennepin County. Your ballot will come by return mail with instructions and a return envelope. You can also track your mailed ballot on the mnvotes.org website to ensure that your vote has been counted.

Progress as of June 30, 2020



Independent living

- 3rd Level Ongoing taping and finishing drywall at units and common areas
- 2nd Level Install of sheetrock at units and common areas to be completed end of week 6/29
- 1st Level We will be coming back to the 1st level units at the senior wing after we transition to the skilled nursing wings.

Skilled Nursing building:

- Mechanical, Electrical, and plumbing rough-ins completed. Week of 6/29 beginning to install insulation. Will begin sheetrock install at units and common areas the week of 7/6
- Area E Completing framing punch list items. Mechanical, electrical, and plumbing rough -ins to begin the week of 7/6

Building Exterior

- We have 99% of all the vinyl windows installed. The few we have left to install will wait until we are done completely stocking the 3rd and 2nd floors.
- The roof is completely dried-in for the building. Install of river rock completed on the flat EPDM roof areas
- Siding install slated to begin the week of 7/6

More than 50 wildfires are started each year in Minnesota by campfires that are not completely extinguished, too large or unattended.

CAMPFIRE SAFETY

- Use a fire ring and build your fire at least five feet away from any combustible material.
- Keep a bucket of water nearby to put out the fire.
- Keep a kid-free zone of three feet around the campfire.
- Never leave your campfire unattended.
- Check burning restrictions with the DNR before starting your campfire.

Fireworks Safety

- Only non-aerial and non-explosive fireworks are legal in Minnesota.
- Never permit children to light fireworks.
- Allow no horseplay and keep bystanders at a safe distance.
- Never light fireworks after drinking alcohol.
- Fireworks should never be lit in a container.
- Keep a bucket of water nearby for emergencies.
- If a firework doesn't go off after it is lit, do not re-light it. Soak it in water and throw it away.
- Flammable liquids, such as gasoline, should be kept at a safe distance.

WEST HENNEPIN PUBLIC SAFETY DEPARTMENT From Chief Gary Kroells - June 30, 2020

Following the death of George Floyd on May 25, 2020, Minnesotans, our country, and the world were horrified and appalled by his death. West Hennepin Public Safety (WHPS) is committed to working with our state lawmakers, stakeholders, and police

commissioners to review our use of force policies and procedures. We must make real changes to ensure excessive and inappropriate use of force does not occur at WHPS.

To keep current on best practice policies and changes in Federal, State and Tribal policies, WHPS has utilized Lexipol Policy Services since 2013. They also review all changes in state legislation, case law and evolving best practices throughout the country. Lexipol utilizes Minnesota state-specific policies vetted by public safety attorneys and law enforcement professionals. Over 3,000 law enforcement agencies among 35 states use Lexipol, including 84 out of 87 County Sheriff Offices in Minnesota. WHPS is committed to transparency with our policies and have posted our complete policy manual on our website www.westhennepin@westhennepin.com.

In reviewing use of force incidents between 2015-2019, WHPS Officers handled 39,610 incident reports, arrested 1,207 individuals, and helped 496 people during a mental health crisis. In these five years WHPS averaged 12 use of force incidents per year with a total 58 use of force cases. Thirty-three (33) incidents involved soft empty hand control escorts, 3 hard empty hand, 6 display Taser incidents, 18 display weapon cases, one taser deployment on a suicidal male who rushed officers and wanted to end his life, and zero cases involving deadly force. In all 58 response to resistance documented cases by WHPS Officers, not one single complaint of excessive force was received.

As required by law, the Minnesota Board of Peace Officers Standards and Training (POST) regulates the licensing for every law enforcement officer in Minnesota. Officers are required to have 48 hours of training every three years to maintain an active peace officer license. That continuing education averages out to 16 hours per year.

On July 1, 2018, the chief law enforcement officer for every state and local law enforcement agency is required to provide training in the areas of crisis intervention and mental illness crisis, conflict management and mediation and recognizing and valuing community diversity and cultural differences to include implicit bias. Each officer is required to attend 16 hours of training in these categories every three years.

In review of our training record between 2015-2019, each WHPS Officer trained over 60 hours per year, far exceeding the POST Board requirements. Training is vital to the growth of our officers' skills. We will continue to push for increased training focusing on de-escalation involving use of force.

WHPS has utilized mobile video recorders in our patrol squads for over twenty years. In 2018 WHPS added Viridian FACT DUTY Weapon Mounted Cameras to each patrol officer's duty weapon. When our officers remove their weapon from their holster the incident is recorded by a weapon mounted camera. In 2019 all patrol squads were updated with new video recorders. Our agency is actively researching the addition of body cameras for each patrol officer.

WHPS Officers are proud and honored to serve the citizens of Maple Plain and Independence. Our agency will continue to evaluate our policies and procedures and will work tirelessly to provide the best police services to our communities.



NIGHT TO UNITE HAS BEEN POSTPONED!

Please join the Minnesota Crime Prevention Association and hundreds of communities throughout the State of Minnesota for the annual Night to Unite (NTU), Minnesota's statewide celebration which normally takes place on the first Tuesday of August of every year has been delayed until the fall due to COVID-19. West Hennepin Public Safety and the State of Minnesota has delayed the celebration until the first Tuesday in October due to the COVID-19 pandemic. Residential Utility Rates - How They Stack Up

The City's utility billing includes charges for water, sewer, and storm sewer drainage.

Rates for all utilities are based on the funding required to cover operation, maintenance, and capital costs of the utility infrastructure which includes lift stations, water treatment plant, water mains and pipes, a water tower, sanitary sewers, and storm water management. Current utility rates are listed below.
