Saturday December 19, 2020, the West Hennepin Public Safety (WHPS) Volunteer Reserve Officers hosted the popular event "View Santa" in Maple Plain and Independence. They have been hosting this event for 40 years.

local food shelves. "Now more than ever we need to provide for others in need," stated Chief Gary Kroells. This year was an exceptional year with many people coming out to visit Santa and giving donations to the local food shelf. The Police Reserves collected over 1,800 pounds of food and \$720.00 in cash donations.

CITY COUNCIL NEARS DECISION ON NEW CITY ADMINISTRATOR

The Maple Plain city council has had a busy 2020 for many reasons. One very important reason is the vacancy in the city administrator position. Entering August, the city council's top shared priority was to hire a city administrator who could facilitate accomplishment of the community's strategic objectives.

So important was the priority, the city council retained the services of Baker Tilly, a professional recruitment firm with a specialty in public sector executive searches. The council acknowledged going it alone was an option, but the coronavirus and the market justified the assistance of a professional.

A total of 54 applications were received, reviewed, and reduced to 14. The 14 received two questionnaires each to garner additional information unique to Maple Plain. There are five finalists remaining who will go through a three step interview process. Each finalist will receive an extensive set of checks including credit, reference, and criminal. Various stakeholders will be asked to participate in the selection process. A final decision is expected in February with the new administrator's start date soon thereafter.

MAPLE PLAIN CITY COUNCIL APPOINTS NEW 2021 FIRE CHIEF

Mayor Julie Maas-Kusske announced that the city council appointed firefighter Ray McCoy as fire chief for the period January 1, 2021 to December 31, 2023. McCoy succeeds Chris Doyle who was appointed in early 2020 to fill the vacancy created by the resignation of 43¹/₂ year veteran David Eisinger.

McCoy has amassed more than 42 years of experience in public safety, 13 years of which as Director of Public Safety of West Hennepin Public Safety. McCoy and his wife, Bobbi, reside in Independence.

Fire Chief McCoy stated that he is proud of the 23-member department he has been called upon to lead. "Firefighters are the heroes of our community who serve day and night under extreme conditions at minimum cost to each of us as taxpayers."

Mayor Maas-Kusske stated that, "The city council has great confidence in Fire Chief McCoy and his command corps. The entire city council looks forward to working with them."

Appointed assistant chiefs were Cory Schultz who has been with the department since 2008 and Brad Couser, a veteran since 1988.

Captains are to be selected shortly to round out the command corps for the Maple Plain department for the next three years. The Maple Plain Fire Department serves Three Rivers Parks, Independence, a portion of Medina, and all of Maple Plain.

Many household cleaning products are labeled as "disposable" or "safe for sewers and septic systems," but the truth is,

they're not. Throw them in the trash where they belong!

You risk damage to your home plumbing every time you flush the wrong thing down your toilet. And if the city treatment plant gets backed up, it affects everyone.

Toilets, sewer pipes, and wastewater treatment facilities were originally designed to transport and handle toilet paper and human waste only.

Don't flush trouble. Trash goes in the trash can - even if the product is labeled flushable.

Throw it, don't flush it!

Winter Snow Reminders



Winter is here with the wonders(?) of a couple of good winter snowfalls. Here are some things to remember:

- Parking is not allowed on any street November 1 to April 15 from 1 am to 7 am. This policy is in effect even when there is no snow. After a 3 inch (or more) snowfall **parking is not allowed** on any city street until that street has been plowed full width.
 - It is unlawful to plow snow onto or across any city, township, county, or state road. Doing so is a violation of State Statutes 160.2715 and 169.42.
- If you live near a fire hydrant, please keep it clear of snow and ice. It could save your life or the life of one of your neighbors.
- Occasionally, snow plowing will result in damage to mailboxes and sod. If you have snowplow damage, snap a picture of the damage and contact City Hall. You can bring it in to City Hall, mail it or email it with an explanation to sspicer@mapleplain.com.

Our Continuing Street Improvement Efforts

Some cities ignore street replacement. Not in Maple Plain.

As part of the City's continuing public improvement efforts in 2021, the City has authorized its consulting engineer, Bolton & Menk, to prepare a feasibility study for the 2021 Street Reconstruction Project, which consists of Drake Street, Perkins Lane, Bradford Street, and Gladview Lane. The proposed scope of the project includes replacement of the water and sanitary sewer mains and services; curb and gutter; storm sewer; and new pavement.

Consistent with past projects, a portion of the costs associated with this work is proposed to be assessed to the benefiting properties. Once the feasibility study is complete, the City will hold a Public Improvement Hearing, at which time residents will have the opportunity to learn more about the project and provide feedback to the City Council. The preliminary schedule for the project is as follows:

- Complete Feasibility Study January 2021
- Public Hearing January 2021
- Prepare Plans and Specifications January to April 2021
- Award Construction Contract May 2021
- Construction June to October 2021

As we proceed through the process, additional project updates that more specifically address the schedule, construction methods, access during construction, and contact information for project personnel will be provided.
