Snowplowing Reminders

- Parking is not allowed on any street from November 1 to April 15 between 1 AM & 7 AM. This policy is in effect even when there is no snow.
- After a 3 inch (or more) snowfall, parking is not allowed on any City street until it has been plowed **full-width**.

Ready, Set, Shovel!

Winter in Minnesota means clearing walkways and driveways. Shoveling early and often is your best tool for preventing slippery situations while also reducing the need to use deicers.

Deicers, like salt, contain the pollutant chloride. *Just one teaspoon of salt permanently pollutes five gallons of water.* Salt does not break down; instead flowing with water melt into our lakes, streams, wetlands, and groundwater. It can impair our water, harm fish and aquatic organisms, damage vegetation, and harm our pets.

Shoveling early and often is the best way to reduce the need for deicers. When deicers must be used, just 1-4 pounds of salt is sufficient for melting ice after shoveling. Salt crystals should be scattered 2-3 inches apart , not in piles. It is also important to always sweep any extra deicers that remain on the pavement after a storm.

Good Neighbor Award Winner 2022 Paul Stinson American Legion Post 514

The Maple Plain City Council has been sponsoring the Good Neighbor Award since 2017. This award is the highest honor granted by the Council to an individual, organization, or business in Maple Plain. The Good Neighbor Award honoree exhibits a lifetime of service and dedication through volunteerism, virtue, civic engagement, and creativity to meet community needs.

2023 Final Budget

City Council hosted the Truth in Taxation Hearing on Monday, December 5th in the City Council Chambers. Staff provided a presentation for the 2023 budget to all those in attendance and Council allowed time for questions as well.

The Final 2023 Levy is \$1,723,947, an increase of \$155,756, or 9.93%. The Final Budget was approved at the December 19, 2022 City Council Business Meeting.

Are Your Neighborhood Fire Hydrants Accessible?

Winter snow can make it difficult for firefighters to find buried fire hydrants. In an emergency, it is essential that fire hydrants be clearly marked and accessible. It takes an average of less than a minute for a firefighter to connect a large fire house to a hydrant, but snow piles that limit access to the hydrant can result in this time being tripled. The Maple Plain Fire Department asks neighborhood volunteers to help clear the snow from the fire hydrants to maintain response time efficiency. If you are unable to clear the snow from a fire hydrant in your neighborhood, please call City Hall at 763-479-0515 and arrangements will be made to have it cleared. Maple Plain Tree Planting Volunteers Needed

The City of Maple Plain is seeking volunteers to assist with tree planting in May of 2023. Nine diseased and dead ash trees were removed from Rainbow Park as a part of the Preparing for Emerald Ash Borers grant that the City was awarded in 2022 by the Minnesota Department of Natural Resources.
